The major thrust of our work is training men to preach. In doing so we seek the services of those who have a particular expertise in preaching.


Recently brother

What Makes A Great Sermon?

Most can provide evaluations of sermons, and some evaluations are better than others. Some good sermons are condemned as being of no value. Some poor sermons are praised as being good.

The opinion expressed about sermons will
disclose as much about
oneself as it does about the
sermon being evaluated.
Read again the sermon of
Jesus in John 8 for Biblical

confirmation of this truth.



Since brother Nichols' presentation of sermon material is fresh in my mind I would like to offer two suggestions for evaluating sermons.

The Preacher

God intended for his message to be delivered by faithful men (II Tim. 2:2). God knew that some men like evil spirits would not present the truth, thus he forbids their participation in furthering the truth (Mark 1:21-28; Acts 16:16-18).

Man, by living a godly life, may greatly enhance the lesson presented and he may likewise detract from the message presented if his life is immoral. Have we not been provided a vivid demonstration of this in the past months by the fall of some messengers of error.

Gus and Flavil Nichols enhanced their sermons by being men of genuine Christian character. (1) They loved the souls of men. (2) They loved God. (3) They preached the Bible with courageous boldness. (4) They prepared for their role of preaching. (5) Unselfish generosity characterized their labors.

Brother Flavil motivated us to be more diligent in study as he recalled the long hours of study made by brother Gus throughout those long years of serving others in the Gospel. This was emphasized as brother Flavil told of the preparation made for the debates and answering false doctrine which was never far removed from them.

No preacher or teacher in

need of spiritual food would be disappointed sitting at the feet of these great men.

This was a contributing factor to the success of Ezra. "For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments" (Ezra 7:10).

The church today would be different if it had in its pulpits and classrooms men of integrity. Reproof, rebuke, and exhortation is more palatable when it comes from a person who commands respect.

The Sermon

In evaluating the content of the sermon there are a number of components which stand out as we listened to brother Nichols. (1) Simplicity. In reviewing the outlines passed out to those in attendance, there was no outline but what the novice as well as the full grown in the faith could have profited and understood. (2) Substance. The sermon outlines were filled with Bible. They were designed to teach the Bible and to motivate men to respect and obey it. Viewed by this criteria we may call them masterpieces. (3) Problem solving. The church has always had problems. It always will. It does today. The Nichols' sermons were not efforts to deceive anyone. They did not dodge any problem which confronted the church in their day. A review of the outlines would make one aware of what the brotherhood faced in their day and how it was assisted in solving major problems. (4) Influential. The lessons presented were timeless. The same basic fundamental truths needed in the past are needed today.

A Specific Example

One of the ways brother Gus will be remembered is his driving home what he called "Generic and Specific" commands. In a pass out provided by brother Flavil there were thirteen (13) lessons which called attention to the distinction between two extremes the church will face in every generation: Those who would make laws for God and those who would take liberty with the law of God.

Preachers, could you present four (4) days of sermon outlines which would be helpful to your fellow preachers? Do you have thirteen (13) charts you could share with one being confronted by liberalism and/or antiism? If a congregation was facing a problem could they obtain help from you?

Conclusion

We are grateful to brother Flavil Nichols for being with us in this series. We have a greater appreciation for preaching and what preaching involves because of his days with us. If you did not take advantage of these occasions you have missed recalling a part of history which would have been of encouragement to you in the faith.

Brother Nichols, we thank you for the lessons and thanks for the memories.


