TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Dear Brethren:

Our Prayers and hopes are that you and the Lord's work are doing well. As for us here, we are doing very well. We have had 32 baptisms as of today's date, but we are still below our

planned goal for 1989.

Brethren, the purpose of this letter is to share some good news with you and make a request. First, the good news, of the 32 baptisms we have had, 5 of them are people who do not understand or speak English very well. The story behind our success

is that in January of this year, we were introduced to brother Joseph Charles by brother Victor Jarrell who preaches for the North Federal church of Christ of Lakeworth, FL. Brother Jarrell taught and baptized brother Charles, (a native of Haiti) and he was at that time assisting brother Charles to enroll in the Florida School of Preaching. After meeting and getting acquainted with brother Charles, we learned that he spoke several languages, one

of which is French. This was an answer to our prayers, since there had been several people attending our worship services who understood and spoke only French. invited brother Charles to come and worship with us, he accepted our invitation, and on January of this year he began worshiping with us, and as a result we have been blessed to baptize 5 precious souls: a man and his wife and a father and two of his teen-age children. Both men preached for the Nazarene Church.

Brethren, both men have expressed a desire to continue preaching, but they realized a need to be taught properly. Both desire to attend the Florida School of Preaching. but is our judgement that only one understands and speaks English well enough progress in his studies at this time. Therefore, we recommend that only one be enrolled.

Brother Hermann Andre is 48 years old, married and has three teen-age children. He says that he needs about \$1,622.00 monthly support in

order for him to attend school full time. We are greatly impressed by brother Andre and we think he will make an excellent student. Therefore, we plan to give him some assistance, but he will need more than what we are able to give. So we are asking others who are able and willing to assist him to please do so. Brethren. brother Andre says, "I am happy to be a member of the church of Christ, and now I feel responsible to share the good news with my people." Please, brethren let us help him fulfill his desire. LIBRARY ACQUISITION

Sister Grace Duke has made a significant contribution to the school library. Mechanical Instruments in worship has been, is now, and always will be a problem for the cause of the Lord. It. is immediately test of one's willingness to abide in the truth or his determination to leave the truth for the traditions of men.

Many who are

uninformed think that the opposition to mechanical instruments of music worship is something that is peculiar to what some term "legalistic members of the Church of Christ." Such expressions betrays their bias and ignorance of the subject under consideration. There have been others who have opposed the use of Mechanical Instruments in worship and they are not members of the churches of Christ. A major work in this area is the work contributed by sister Duke.

The work which sister Duke secured for the School Library is a Doctoral dissertation, 1965, from Columbia University by James William McKinnon. It is entitled The Church Fathers and Musical Instruments.

Sister Duke secured the copy by having the microfilm sent to a local library and then having it photo-copied for the school library. The copy may not be checked out, but it is available for anyone to read.


Why not resolve to attend next year? I am sure that it will make a difference in your spiritual maturity.

The students, faculty and interested individuals were privileged to sit at the feet of brother Eugene

Clevenger for the week following our Annual Lectureship for a series special studies in Paul's



Epistles. Brother Clevenger retired from Abilene Christian University having taught Bible there and at David Lipscomb University in Nashville. In addition to this brother Clevenger has preached for a number of years.

It is the conviction of the school that our training is better if we have as much exposure as possible to faithful and Godly preachers of the Gospel. Preachers who have prepared themselves and have been faithful proclaimers of the truth are the greatest assets to preacher training.

One trained in other fields may be able to assist in that field, but young preachers need the insights available from those who have both prepared themselves in the Book and weathered the storms of life while remaining faithful. We feel fortunate to

have brother Clevenger to be with us.

Brother Clevenger is a graduate of Freed-Hardeman College, 1941. He received the B.A. from Pepperdine College, in 1944, and the B.D. from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Louisville, Kentucky, in 1947. He also has done work at Duke University, Durham, N.C. Neil Lightfoot says that brother Clevenger "is no one of the best 'sermonizers' living today. His resources are rich, combining a broad educational background and years of evangelistic experience with the rare virtue of a detailed knowledge of the Bible text. He also possesses a firsthand acquaintance of the Bible languages (Greek and Hebrew) -- a rather unique ability among pulpit preachers."

Many years ago I obtained a book of sermon outlines by brother Clevenger--Sermons for Saints and Sinners. received much practical help in preparing lessons from his outlines. In the coming years I am sure our students will look back with grateful appreciation to the school and to brother Clevenger for the insights he has offered them in this special series on Paul's Epistles.
