

Fellowship In The Furtherance of the Gospel

If you are interested in the *Florida School of Preaching* we are sure that you will enjoy knowing of these activities and the additional training received by students.

SCOTLAND

We requested information from those on the Scotland trip and were given the bulletin from the Bell Shoals Church of Christ in Brandon, Florida. The preacher there is Jack Strachan a native of Scotland. John Strachan is a student in the Florida School of Preaching and a son of Jack. John returned to Scotland with the group for the summer. Graham McDonald is a full time student as well as being a native of Scotland. He too returned to Scotland with the group. Both John and Graham are second year students here. Brian Kenyon is a second year student and he was a part of the campaign as well. Edward and Florence Duffy have attended the school and were a part of this group. The following words are written by Jack Strachan in his bulletin:



The past two months have been so hectic, but also very enjoyable as we worked with several congregations in Scotland. We preached at East Kilbride, Peterhead, Cumbernauld and Glenrothes. . . . The average attendance was 120. We had six baptisms as a result of this effort. . . . Brother and sister Clifford Newell from the Florida School of Preaching in Lakeland, preached meetings at Peterhead, Cumbernault, Glenrothes and

East Kilbride. . . . We deeply appreciate each one who committed time, effort and finances to help the churches in Scotland. JAMAICA

The Central Church of Christ, Clearwater, Florida, for the second year sent both student and graduates of the Florida School of Preaching to help brethren in Jamaica. Brother Clifford A. Jamaica on a whole has greatly benefitted from this work. Your work-team arrived in Jamaica to work—and 'work' they surely effected. It is a great work done and can only be explained in the light of the effects it produced.

Two weeks ago the full team of workers arrived in Jamaica on the North coast which they could only view, but not enjoy nor even fully notice because it was work from the point of arrival—loading cars, driving on the 'wrong' side of the road in order to be 'RIGHT' often times no doubt being frightened our of the wit and in wonderment, seeing the other driver coming at them!!! The trip to Moneague was safe, but their anticipated arrival in Jamaica was thwarted by unforseen circumstances. The late flight was late, late. . . .

Dear Brethren Carr and Stearsman:





Dear Brother Carr,

"Bring Your Neighbor Day" was a great success! On August 26, 1990 we set a goal attendance of 53, one more than had been previously achieved. With the help of each member by encouraging and inviting their friends and neighbors, we achieved an attendance of 67 for Sunday morning worship with Bible study attendance of 53. These numbers have not been seen in Canton in at least twelve (12) years. We are thrilled with the growth of the congregation and the dedication and desire for the growth of each member of the congregation. . . .

At the September business meeting, the men of the congregation made a decision based upon faith. We have decided to drop \$300.00 per month of our outside support. This will require an increase of approximately \$60.00 per week in our giving. The men here are determined to work toward the goal of becoming fully self-supporting. To do this, we must force ourselves by giving up a portion of our outside support. . . .

"IT'S NEVER BEEN THIS LATE BEFORE—"

The story is told that a man and his wife had gone to bed, having wound up the old clock and turned out the lights. They had not been sleeping too long until the old clock struck 13 times. The wife nudged her husband and said, "Pa, we had best wake up—it's never been this late before." I could not verify whether or not this is a true story. I do know that if a clock strikes that many times something is wrong.

There are certain sounds being heard today, from our brethren, that indicates something is wrong. These things indicate that we are drifting from the truth at a very rapid pace. So few seem to care. Here are a few of the things we are hearing:

- I "Most of our worship is based upon tradition rather than the Bible."
- I "The only reason we don't have women preachers and elders or deacons is because of our tradition."
- I "We need to realize there are uninspired parts of the Bible."
- I "We should pray to Jesus as well as to God. The Bible teaches this is alright. It would also be acceptable to pray to

the Holy Spirit."

I "I'm not sure there is any sense in which the law of Moses has been abolished."

I "We should not be judgmental toward other religious people."

I "There is as much scripture to support solos and choirs as there is for congregational singing."

I "What's wrong with singing during the Lord's Support?"

Supper?"

- I "The idea a lot of people have had about religion holds that it is a matter of finding all the rules and living up to them."
- I "We don't have to agree on everything to have unity and fellowship."

I "Everything we do is worship."

In reference to the Crossroads "Confession": "let us open our arms and hearts to receive brothers and sisters from the Boston Movement who are searching for a vibrant and active church that is full of love and liberty in Christ."

These are but a few of the things we are hearing today that are cause for alarm. When we see the sermon topics of so many of our preachers today that stress everything from counseling to politics, when we elders find who are unconcerned about the lost and the things being taught from the pulpit, when we hear more about fellowship than we do about salvation, when we see more interest expressed in playing than in preaching and when we see more concern for the physical well being of the body than we do for an Immortal soul, we are made to groan in spirit.

Brethren, It is high time we wake up: It has never been this late before.



Fall Enrollment



The school began the fall semester September 10, 1990. To date there are forty-four (44) students enrolled. There are prospects of additional students for the second semester. We will also have graduates to be leaving in January. We have the largest enrollment in many years in New Testament Greek with sixteen (16) enrolled. There are more than twenty (20) enrolled in the Tuesday evening class



that is taught by brother J.H. Blackman.

There are full time students from Scotland and two men from Haiti now enrolled and a third Haitian is to be enrolled in January. We are still hoping to have a full time student from Jamaica. The only hindrance is immigration regulations.

We know that all who support us are proud of our potential this year. Pray for us.
