A Critique of Some Degrading, Unreasonable And **Unnecessary Statements**

This writer is continually concerned by the phraseology emanating from some preachers and members of the church. Must one degrade one facet of Christianity to emphasize another? To degrade is "to deprive of standing or true function." A preacher, in trying to show the importance of brotherly love and togetherness, said, "Doctrine does not really

matter if there is no love and togetherness." Sound doctrine always matters! By their conduct, men may adorn sound doctrine (Titus 2:10) or they may live contrary to its message (I Tim. 1:9-10). Their conduct cannot diminish the "true function" sound doctrine. "love out of a pure heart . . . a good conscience . . and unfeigned faith" (I Tim. 1:5–11). Sound doctrine according to the glorious gospel of God always stands in opposition to all error.

These unreasonable statements are disturbing. One brother said, "I'd rather be a member of a congregation that is doing evangelism in the wrong way than to be a member of a congregation that is not evangelistic." This is

an unreasonable statement because it contrasts two unnecessary and unacceptable options. You can be a member of a congregation which does evangelism and does it in a scriptural manner. Another said, "We do not have enough fulfillment in love and hospitality." One's attitude toward love and hospitality is often determined by whether he is a giver or a receiv-

are not only degrading andunreasonable—they are unnecessary! There are no necessities for doing the right thing in the wrong way. One does not need to lessen the importance of doctrine in order

of love and together-

ness. Doctrine and love

are not antagonistic concepts. Biblical doctrine is the conduit through which love flows. First John 5:3 reads, "For this is the love of God, that we keep his commandments:" How do we know we have the fulfillment of love toward our brethren? "By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God, and keep his commandments" (I John 5:2). The practice and presentation of the right doctrine is essential to salvation. "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine; continue in them: for in doing this thou shalt both save thyself, and them that hear thee" (I Tim. 4:16).
