

Reflections from Church History

In teaching Church History I try to keep before me the lessons that should be learned. This includes the good and the bad. The guiding principle to which I am committed is the proper application of the Bible to life (James 1:21ff.; I Thess. 5:21–22; III John 11; II John 9–11 et al.). In view of these things the study of what has taken place in the realm of religion (i.e., Church History) is very interesting.

Consider the following quotations from our Church History Text. May we learn lessons from the past to help us today.

The Philosophy

"The church can practice separation from culture, or it can practice synthesis. The Scholastics did the latter."

This quotation is not Biblically sound. Jesus was in the world but he did not become a part of the world. Jesus teaches his followers that they too will be in the world but must not be as

the world (John 17:14-19).

The Standard

It is essential that we realize what constitutes the standard of our religious convictions as well as those of others. It is not possible to justify some religious positions for they are con-

tradictory. Some have as their doctrine that which is foreign to the Bible. Consider carefully the substance of some who seek to rationalize that which is unreasonable.

"The content of their study was the Bible, the cannons and creeds of the ecumenical councils, and the writings of the fathers of the church. The question that they wished to settle involved whether or not the faith was reasonable."

It should be obvious that anything may be "reasonable" given the broad field of creeds, councils, the writings of the fathers, etc. However, we must not forget that reasoning in this fashion will result in irrationality. We cite again the Church History Text. To many that which becomes the content of faith is accepted on other than rational grounds. "It must be believed merely on authority apart from reason, for much that was stated by the church to be authoritative could not be demonstrated by reason." "Theological dogmas were not rationally demonstrable . . . this view separated faith and reason . . ."

In subsequent years men treated religious issues in a different manner than they did scientific issues. They "reasoned" one way when considering scientific issues and another way when considering religious issues. Today it does not bother some religious people that their views are foreign to the Bible or contradict the teaching of the Bible. They have bought the philosophy of the day that makes religious issues subjective and not objective; irrational and not rational; determined by tradition and culture and not by the proper handling of Biblical truth.

The Church History Text makes another significant observation. "After 1050 the Scholastics replaced the fathers of the church as the main guardians of the truth, and doctor became as great a term of honor as father had been earlier in the history of the church." The quotations are from Earle E. Cairns, Christianity Through The Centuries (Revised and Enlarged Edition), pages 231–239.

Is History Being Repeated?

As I taught this chapter (Chapter 23) I could not but relate what happened in the past with what is happening today. What the religious world in general has done the Lord's people in some places are duplicating. Consider some influential folk and the methodology they are pursuing. (1) There is much concern today with "Scholars" and "Doctors." We hear of "The Christian Scholarship Confer-

ence" at some of the Universities among us. In the mind set of some it is unthinkable to scold the scholars; unimaginable to doctor the Doctors. (2) The informed know that there are some of influence who have rejected sound reasoning as a basis for determining religious matters. The emphasis is upon "fellowship," and the basis of the proposed

fellowship is the acceptance of that which is not Biblical. (3) In promoting doctrines which are not justified by the Bible appeal is made to the "Fathers" and "traditions" in the Restoration Movement. Is it not the case that we can cite some writing of this movement that would justify most any doctrinal position held by men? (4) In view of so much confusion, the rejection of proper respect for the Bible, and the denial of sound reasoning some are calling for a "New Hermeneutic."

Are we not seeing history being repeated? How are the actions of some among us different from those of the past? We affirm that the Doctors of the Christian Scholars can not justify that which is irrational. If fellowship is to be had with the diverse factions of the Restoration Movement, it will not be on the basis of Biblical faith. It will not be on the basis of sound reasoning.

We should heed the words of the Apostle John, "Beloved, follow not that which is evil, but that which is good. He that doeth good is of God: but he that doeth evil hath not seen God" (III John 11). To do otherwise is to forfeit our fellowship with God and the Christ. "Whosoever transgresseth, and abideth not in the doctrine of Christ, hath not God. He that abideth in the doctrine of Christ, he hath both the Father and the Son. If there come any unto you, and bring not this doctrine, receive him not into your house, neither bid him God speed: For he that biddeth him God speed is partaker of his evil deeds" (II John 9–11). The words of Paul must not be forgotten. "For we dare not make ourselves of the number, or compare ourselves with some that commend themselves: but they measuring themselves by themselves, and comparing themselves among themselves, are not wise" (II Cor. 10:12). "For not he that commendeth himself is approved, but whom the Lord commendeth" (II Cor. 10:18).

REPORT FROM INDIA

The church is growing in India. Many are being baptized, including Hindus, Muslims, and denominational preachers. Congregations are being established, and the church lacks only a few states now in having congregations of the Lord's church in all of the 26 states of India. In all of the meetings there were 519 baptisms. . . .

If congregations would save their communion cups and not destroy them, then give them to some one going over, or send to me, the brethren would be very grateful for them. Too, they need Bibles and Testaments at all times. There were some dangerous incidents at times, but I made the trip okay, and glad to be back home. . . . Best wishes for the New Year.
