What You May Expect At The Florida School of Preaching

Anyone contemplating attending a school has a right to know what is expected of them as well as what to expect from the institution. In view of this I wish to reflect upon some things a student may anticipate who attends the Florida School of Preaching.

Respect for the Bible

Any school proposing to prepare men to preach the truth must have a profound respect for the Bible. You may expect the Bible to be taught, memorized and defended.

We know full well that a variety of views are provided with most any verse or idea in the Bible. Truth (what does the Bible teach), and not a variety of opinions is our goal. We know the Bible teaches that God's ways and man's ways are not always the same. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, saith the LORD. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isa. 55:8-9).

Therefore, we are to "Buy the truth, and sell it not; also wisdom, and instruction, and understand—ing" (Prov. 23:23).

As God is our helper we shall ever propose this as our guiding philosophy; the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.

Love for the Church

If we are to judge by the writing and actions of some in the church we must conclude that their attitude appears to be that of bitterness and ill will toward the church. With such persons we refuse to be associated.

We are concerned for the church that Jesus died to purchase (Eph. 5:25). We respect the Bible and know that it teaches that there is but one body (Eph. 4:4) and that

this one body is the church (Eph. 1:22–23).

The church of Christ is unique. No other institution known to man has such a high and holy calling. To not know and identify with the church for which Jesus died is to make a decision with grave consequences.

Those who would teach that one church is as good as another, and that God and the Christ are as pleased when we are in man made Churches as they are when we are in His blood bought body, are being irresponsible teachers.

We can know the truth and the truth will make us free (John 8:32). We know the truth about the church and will not permit another to take us captive to his vain philosophy developed from the foolish imaginations of disobedient men (Col. 2:8).

Love for the Lost

Because of our respect for the Bible we know that men are lost without the good news (the gospel). Men sin when they disobey God. Men disobey God when
