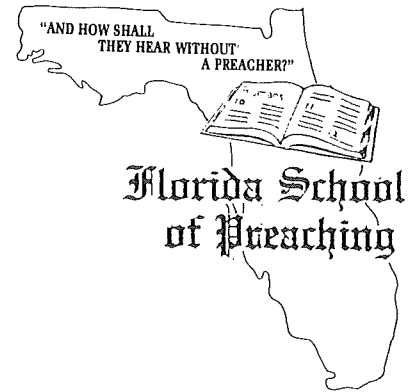

## Booster Banquet Honors J.H. Blackman, Jr

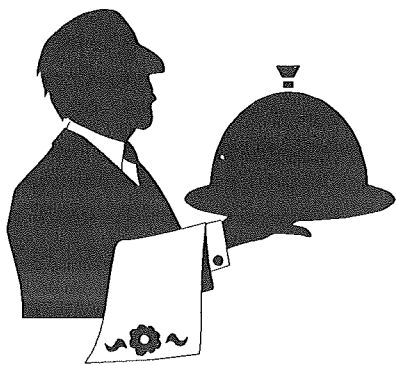

## "Help Those Women ..."

Today, as always, there is controversy associated with the cause of the Lord. There are politically minded women that are demanding what they feel are their forbidden rights. This issue has reached the highest court of our land and it touches impoverished souls as well. Those wishing to find favor with women for political reasons will appeal to the women, and if women are not wise they may be used and/or abused in the process. It is possible for women to be used by those in religious circles for selfish ends. Therefore, we would be surprised if the role and position of women in the church did not become an issue.

Truth may not be fairly represented by the most vocal. "But the Jews stirred up the devout and honourable women, and the chief men of the city, and raised persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and expelled them out of their coasts" (Acts 13:50). There are those at work among us that would stir up certain women in order to gain a selfish end and their goal is to change the organization of the church. In their misguided zeal they think that to conform to the world would make it more acceptable to the truth. Such will never succeed. Those

familiar with the Bible know otherwise.

Some zealous champions would have us believe that we are abusive and disrespectful to women when we advocate what God stipulates. The Bible presents a case for great service of woman in the cause of the Lord.

Paul had women who labored with him in the gospel, and he was interested in their assistance from the church at Philippi. "And I intreat thee also, true yokefellow, help those women which laboured with me in the gospel, with Clement also, and with other my fellowlabourers, whose names are in the book of life" (Phil. 4:3). When Saul was persecuting the church he persecuted women for they comprised a large number of its membership (Acts 8:8; 9:2; 22:4).

When the Lord came to this world to lift all and to enable all to see themselves in the eyes of a benevolent God he was assisted and comforted by women. At the cross and at the resurrection the gospels remind us of their presence (Matt. 28:2; Luke 23:49, 55).

The church began with a number of women in it (Acts 1:14). When Paul received the Macedonian call it was the household of Lydia who became the first converts in the Philippian church (Acts 16:13).

The Bible regulates the function of both men and women in the church. To teach, as does the Bible, that women should not exercise authority over men or to teach over men is not to suppress women. It does not degrade women. It could not, for He who made us made the stipulations (I Tim. 2:8-15). That women were doing a great work in the cause of the Lord can not be denied. Paul admonished that they be helped.

**Let us help these women!**

Paul names Aphia the wife of Philemon and their son Archippus; he is thankful for them and their concern for all the saints they refreshed—Was this not a family affair (Philemon 1-8)?

### Help Encouraging Women

Encouragement helps everyone. Barnabas played a major role in the development of souls working with the church in encouraging and edifying others. Superficial platitudes from insincere people mean nothing. The sincere and genuine well wishes of souls that love the Lord help to sustain us.

In addition to preaching and working in Kingston some teaching was done in Tydixon and Linstead.

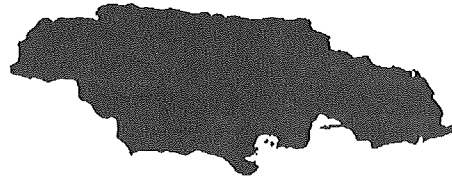
