

# Preparing Souls To Serve The Lord

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## Who Decides? What Makes It Right?

There is a need to understand what consititutes acceptable authority in religious matters. Men reject to their utter shame and sorrow the truth of God. Romans 15:4 states, "For whatsoever things were written aforetime were written for our learning, that we through patience and comfort of the scriptures might have hope." What makes an attitude or action right? Who decides it?

#### Not Man Alone

Man himself, without help from the Word of God, is unable to determine what is religiously right or wrong. Trying to reason with some religious persons is fruitless. They have no standard but themselves. When shown the folly of their position, rather than comply with the truth, they hew themselves out new cisterns, broken cisterns that hold

no water (Jer. 2:23). Let us never forget: "O Lord, I know that the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps" (Jer. 10:23).

#### Not Race Or National Origin

The Jews were once the recipents of eternal truth and as a nation were to be a light and blessing to all others. Today there are no chosen nations, no chosen race, the grace of God is for all (Tit. 2:11). To determine what is religiously right we must have something that is above the individual, the group, the race, the nation, the special person(s). We must have that which applies to all with equal merit and justice.

#### Not The Majority

We know this to be true. It is the case that the majority

may be right but it is not right simply because the majority decided it. There must be something above the majority that determines right or wrong religiously. The majority were wrong in Noah's day (Gen. 6). The majority were wrong in the case of the twelve spies (Numb. 12–13). The majority are often wrong today. Who decides the issue? How may we be sure?

#### **Not The Minority**

Diotrephes (III John 9–10) caused difficulties in the early church. Single individuals today may block a good work. Korah and his crowd were a minority movement but they were wrong (Numb. 16). Their rebellion is cited for a lesson to all (Jude 11). Lot was a minority in Sodom. Being in the minority in and of itself does not prove anything. There must be some objective standard that

is understandable and that is to be applied to all. We can not always go with the minority in religious matters. Who decides?

#### Not By A Special Group

The twelve spies were a special group as were the princes with Korah in his rebellion. "Now Korah, the son of Izhar, the son of Kohath, the son of Levi, and Dathan and Abiram, the sons of Eliab, and On, the son of Peleth, sons of Reuben, took men: And they rose up before Moses, with certain of the children of Israel, two hundred and fifty princes of the assembly, famous in the congregation, men of renown: And they gathered themselves together against Moses and against Aaron, and said unto them, Ye take too much upon you, seeing all the congregation are holy, every one of them, and the Lord is among them: wherefore then lift ye up yourselves above the congregation of the Lord?" (Numb. 16:1-3).

Some may think the "would-be-some-whats-among-us" decide it—but they are wrong. Truth does not belong to a special group. It is for all. It can be had by all (Prov. 23:23). Those who abide in it are free (John 8:31-32). Those who know the truth know that the so called "doctors" and "scholars" working to segregate and divide us are wrong.

Having a degree is no guarantee you will love and obey the truth any more than having a million dollars is a guarantee that you will be charitable and faithful.

#### Not By A Person In A Special Position

Even a king is to submit to his Master. Prophets could depart, and did. In a single chapter we have recorded the digression of a king and two prophets, one prophet is old and the other prophet is young. Neither age nor youth are sufficient, God's will must be obeyed or you are sure to face defeat (I Kings 13).

The Priest and prophets, individuals who were in a position to make a difference, often hindered the cause of right and truth. "A wonderful and horrible thing is committed in the land; The prophets prophesy falsely, and the priests bear rule by their means; and my people love to have it so: and what will ye do in the end thereof" (Jer. 5:30–31)?

The Apostle Peter had to comply with more than his position. He was under obligation to live by the truth of the gospel and did not alway do so (Gal. 2:11-14).

### The Bible Properly Interpreted Determines What Is Right

All God has ever required is that they that have his Word handle it properly. If they/we do the results will be clear to all. "The prophet that hath a dream, let him tell a dream; and he that hath my word, let him speak my word faithfully. What is the chaff to the wheat? saith the Lord. Is not my word like as a fire? saith the Lord; and like a hammer that breaketh the rock in pieces?" (Jer. 23:28–29).

The Bible warns us of those that would twist the Scriptures to their own destruction. It teaches us that we may be carried away by their wickedness (II Pet. 3:14–18). If the Bible teaches that we may know when a person is misinterpreting the Bible, and it does, then we of necessity may know when we are correctly interpreting it.

Those persons who do not believe the Bible may be properly understood are wrong. What some use to justify their actions have not the approval of God. Who decides it? God does. Where can I find His decision? In His Word the Bible.

Why have not all men found the truth, and why do men not agree? We must recognize that the will of man is also a factor. Some do not have the will to believe and to obey (Psalm 10:4; Matt. 23:37).

How many do you know who have mined the Sacred Writings the way Solomon said they must be mined and have come away empty handed? "My son, if thou wilt receive my words, and hide my commandments with thee; So that thou incline thine ear unto wisdom, and apply thine heart to understanding; Yea, if thou criest after knowledge, and liftest up

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
