Wise Parenting

There is a generation that curses its father, And does not bless its mother. ¹²There is a generation that is pure in its own eyes, Yet is not washed from its filthiness. ¹³There is a generation-oh, how lofty are their eyes! And their eyelids are lifted up. ¹⁴There is a generation whose teeth are like swords, And whose fangs are like knives, To devour the poor from off the earth, And the needy from among men. (Pr. 30:11-14, NKJ)

Although this commentary was written nearly three thousand years ago, it is characteristic of many young people in this present generation. Unfortunately, this would also describe some who were "brought up" in the church of Christ. The fact that the church of Christ in this country is losing her youth once they leave home is attested by the numbers themselves. A church that cannot "hold its own" is a church that, among other things, is not retaining its young people after they are grown. The purpose of this article is to introduce wisdom's instruction about parenting. We will focus upon the wisdom of God as revealed in the Book of Proverbs, which contains "down to earth" parental information. Contrary to popular thought, active youth groups, large congregations, etc. (though a blessing when available) are not an absolute necessity in order to have our children remain faithful. The number one factor is proper parenting!

A Serious Obligation

All parents, especially Christians, have a serious obligation to properly train their children. This training involves not only the proper verbal instruc-

tion, but even more importantly, it must involve the proper example. "My son, give me your heart, And let your eyes observe my ways" (Pr. 23:26).

The entire family is involved in the proper training of children (Pr. 14:1; 31:10-31). Fathers are obviously involved—many of the Proverbs are written from the perspective of a father teaching his son (Pr. 1:8, 10, 15; 2:1; 3:1, 11; etc.). Mothers are also involved (Pr. 14:1; 31:1, 10-31). Perhaps the most under estimated members of the family that can have a great impact on children, especially in our culture, are grandparents. They are certainly involved in training their grandchildren (Pr. 4:1-4). One way grandparents effect the training of their grandchildren is by having first properly trained their children before they became parents. Another way grandparents effect the training of their grandchildren is by teaching them directly (cf. 2 Tim. 1:5). This is especially needful in contemporary American culture because of the many broken homes in society. Many children have little or no stability at home; thus, positive family values are going to have to come from grandparents.

Trust God's Wisdom

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, And lean not on your own understanding; ⁶In all your ways acknowledge Him, And He shall direct your paths. ⁷Do not

2013 Lectureship Schedule "Do You Understand Biblical Morality?" On Page 3 be wise in your own eyes; Fear the LORD and depart from evil. ⁸It will be health to your flesh, And strength to your bones. (Pr. 3:5-8)

Although this passage is often memorized by children in their Bible classes, it is the parents who must first put this passage to practice. How many parents "trust in the Lord" enough to diligently search His will and practice it, especially in the area of training children? Sometimes parents place more trust in the so called "experts" in child rearing rather than in God's instruction. One's entire being must be immersed in the wisdom of God (cf. Pr. 4:20-27). If parents are to teach their children to be immersed in God's wisdom, and they are (Pr. 4:20-27), and if parents are to be a positive example to their children, and they are (Pr. 23:26), then parents must themselves be immersed in the wisdom of God so that they can successfully teach it to their children. When parents and grandparents fail to value God's wisdom in the home, the children and grandchildren will most likely fail to value God's wisdom.

Properly Discipline Children

There is tremendous value in discipline, even discipline which involves corporal punishment (i.e., spanking). Parents who truly love their children will lovingly correct them when they need correcting, even if it may involve spanking (Pr. 3:11-12). The Hebrews writer makes application to this proverb (Heb. 12:7-11). He says that just as administering chastise-

ment is an inherent part of being a loving father, so receiving chastisement is an inherent part of being a child in good standing with his or her father (Heb. 12:7-8); parents who properly chastise their children gain their children's respect (Heb. 12:9); and properly administered chastisement promotes godly characteristics: "holiness" and "peaceable fruit of righteousness" (Heb. 12:10-11). All that it takes to see the failure of parents disciplining their children is an observance of society as a whole, and even some church services. It is important for children to receive the proper discipline while they are very young because it is possible that given too late, discipline will not have the most positive effect (Pr. 19:18).

Many parents truly love their children and want what is best for them, but they do not know God's word on the subject of discipline. The following two extremes are seen today: (1) some parents think they are doing their children wrong if their children get upset and cry; and (2) others think that no discipline will make their children happier. Parents, however, must realize that God, who created humanity, knows what is best for humanity.

He who spares his rod hates his son, But he who loves him disciplines him promptly. (Pr. 13:24)

Do not withhold correction from a child, For if you beat him with a rod, he will not die. ¹⁴You shall beat him with a rod, And deliver his soul from hell. (Pr. 23:13-14)

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


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Train Children

Parents must properly train their children. God says, "Train up a child in the way he should go, And when he is old he will not depart from it" (Pr. 22:6). This, or course, is not to say that every Scripturally trained child will always remain faithful. Not even God Himself could have that guarantee

(Isa. 1:2). Proverbs are not meant to be "absolutized"—they are not 100% money back guarantees (Smith 470). They are generalizations of how things usually work in life. For example, a "soft answer" does not always "turn away wrath" (Pr. 15:1 cf. Mt. 26:62-65), though generally it does. Additionally, not everyone who "finds a wife" necessarily "finds a good thing" (Pr. 18:22 cf. Ahab who found Jezebel). Thus, a child, due to his or her free will, may choose not to follow godly instruction (cf. Adam and Eve; Ezk. 18:20). However, the fact that the Proverbs are general truths is no excuse—many par-

ents in the church of Christ are failing to properly train their children. Parents, let us take seriously our duty to properly train our children in the ways of God!
